



Murrumbidgee Trails officially launched

After twelve months of hard work behind the scenes the Riverina's newest tourism marketing collective Murrumbidgee Trails was officially launched at Whitton Malt House on Wednesday 18 November.

The Murrumbidgee Trails marketing collective consisting of Leeton Shire, Lockhart Shire, Narrandera Shire and Murrumbidgee Councils was established in November last year, tasked with a destination marketing project to develop a new collaborative marketing campaign to reach a broad range of visitors. The campaign would comprise a visitor guide to replace individual guides for each Council, a website and social media platforms (Instagram and Facebook).

Lockhart Shire Council Mayor Roger Schirmer said that Lockhart Shire has the potential to attract large visitor numbers from Albury-Wodonga and the regional Victoria market on the back of the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic into the Murrumbidgee Trails region.

"Lockhart Shire Council is thrilled to be working with like-minded Councils as part of this marketing collective to deliver a project that has a very clear regional focus. This is the first visitor guide we have had that showcases Lockhart in quite a few years and we are really pleased that it has such a strong focus on the drive tourism market."

Mayoral Annual Report

The opportunity to report to you on the Council's activities for the 2019/20 financial year is also an opportunity to reflect on a 12 month period that ended in very different circumstances to what we would have envisaged at the beginning of the financial year in July 2019. Instead of reporting on what would have been the final year of the Council's four year term which commenced in September 2016, as we all now know the Minister for Local Government has decided to extend by one year the term of the current Councillors and hold elections for Council in September 2021. This is one of many changes brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic. The 12 month extension will give continuity to local government in these challenging times.



The restrictions on gatherings and movements and the border controls imposed through Public Health Orders in response to the pandemic have impacted on all aspects of our daily lives. The Public Health Orders also resulted in the closure of a number of facilities including museums and visitor information centre, caravan parks and camping grounds as well as playgrounds.

Financially, I believe the Council has weathered the storm with the pandemic having only a limited impact on Council's finances. This is largely because the Council does not rely on income from the facilities that were closed to the public as they are predominantly managed by volunteer based management committees. However the closures will have robbed these committees of an income source and fundraising opportunities and Council has sought to address this in the 2020/21 Budget.

COVID-19 has also prompted an unprecedented amount of grant funding being made available by Federal and State Governments to help overcome the economic impacts of the pandemic. Grant funding programmes announced in the latter half of 2019/20 from which Lockhart Shire will benefit include the Drought Communities Programme, the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Programme and the Showground Stimulus Funding Programme. Whilst announced in 2019/20 many of the projects to be funded by these programmes will not materialise until 2020/21 and will include a wide range of projects including upgrades to our recreation grounds, public hall improvements, youth programs, water supply extensions, footpath construction and development of tourist attractions.

Whilst the final months of 2019-20 were dominated by the pandemic, the financial year overall was a productive one with a number of high profile projects completed amongst a number of other achievements.

The new swimming pool complex at The Rock was officially opened in October 2019 in time for the 2019/20 swimming season. The new complex was the venue for a very successful Australia Day celebration on 26 January 2020 hosted by The Rock Recreation Ground Management Committee where we once again had the opportunity to acknowledge those who have made a significant contribution to the Committee with the presentation of Australia Day Citizen Awards. Following on the official opening of the new Lockhart swimming pool complex in October 2018, both facilities have been well received by the community as evidenced by the increased patronage since their refurbishment.

The installation of a new all abilities playground at The Rock Recreation Ground adjacent to the new swimming pool has also helped make this a very appealing recreational area for the town.

Our efforts to mitigate the risk of flooding in our two major towns also took another significant step forward in 2019/20 with the completion of stage 2 of the Lockhart flood mitigation project. Council has a grant

application pending for stage 2 of The Rock flood mitigation project following the completion of Stage 1 in June 2019.

We cannot forget that the Lockhart Shire is predominantly an agricultural area and Council continues to pursue projects that support our farming businesses. In 2019/20 these included the following projects which were over and above our recurring road maintenance programs:-

- The widening of 22km of the Lockhart to Urana Road which will provide much safer passage of traffic from Lockhart to Urana. Work commenced in 2019/20 and is due to be completed in the first half of 2020/21.
- The trimming of trees beside roads throughout the Shire allowing for easier passage by high, wide loads on our roads.
- Work on the Flood Bypass Road at Lockhart will allow heavy vehicles to travel around the town.
- Upgrading of a number of bridges and culverts across the Shire to facilitate higher mass limit vehicles which commenced in 2019/20 and will be completed in 2020/21 in time for the much anticipated harvest.

I'm also proud to say that Lockhart Shire Council received a Local Government NSW Excellence in the Environment Award for its recycling initiative involving the use of crushed glass in its road base. Our pug mill, a large piece of equipment which mixes the gravel and glass at the rate of 6 to 1 has proved invaluable as you can also add water at the time of mixing thus speeding up the compaction process on the widened road edges.

The latest addition to the Shire's public art trail, the Milbrulong Water Tower mural, has been completed and has generated much attention on social media. Congratulations to everyone involved and thank you to Riverina Water whose permission and financial support made the project possible. Planning is well underway for the Yerong Creek Water Tower mural which when completed will link with the Lockhart and Milbrulong Water Tower murals for a public art trail through the Shire.

Some significant steps were taken in 2019/20 towards the Lockhart Renewable Energy Project with funding secured to enable Better Energy Technology to undertake Stage 1 of the project which included, amongst other things, the granting of development approval for the project. This has been a complex and time consuming process and will continue to progress in 2020/21.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow councillors for their support throughout the year and the collegiate approach they take in carrying out their role in the best interests of the Shire. I also express my appreciation to the many volunteers on whom Council relies on so much to manage a variety of public facilities, and to the Council's hardworking and loyal staff.

The 2019/20 financial year commenced with the Shire and the broader region continuing to be drought affected. Our resilience was further tested with the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic. However I am pleased to be able to say that as 2019/20 drew to a close, conditions were vastly improved for farmers to be able to have one of the best sowing starts experienced for years as we look forward to a more promising 2020/21.

Audited Financial Statements

Council's Auditors, Auditor-General, Audit Office of New South Wales, have completed the audit of Council's Financial Statements for the year ending 30 June 2020. The Audited Financial Statements and Auditor's Report were presented at the Council meeting held on 16 November 2020.

The Council achieved a surplus in net operating result from continuing operations (including capital contributions) of \$4.22M (2019: \$2.53M) for the year ended 30 June 2020. The net operating surplus for the year <u>before</u> grants and contributions provided for capital purposes is \$157K (2019: \$427K).

The size of Council's operations has remained relatively consistent over the past three years with increases in rates and annual charges being attributable to the annual permissible increase (2.7% in 2019/2020) for rates and annual charges increase being a combination of CPI and operating costs

Employee costs have increased in line with the Local Government State Award.

Council has undertaken an extensive capital works program which has involved \$9.34M of new and upgrades to Council's infrastructure, property, plant & equipment, buildings and sewer assets.

Performance Measures

The following section provides an overview of the Council's performance against the performance measures and performance benchmarks set by the Office of Local Government (OLG) within the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment.


Operating performance ratio

- The 'operating performance ratio' measures how well Council contained operating expenditure within operating revenue (excluding capital grants and contributions, fair value adjustments, and reversal of revaluation decrements). The benchmark set by the former Office of Local Government (OLG) is greater than 0%.
- The Council's operating performance ratio of 8.37% is above the industry benchmark of greater than 0 per cent.
- The ratio has decreased due to the increase in operating expenses during the year.



Own source operating revenue ratio


- The 'own source operating revenue ratio' measures Council's fiscal flexibility and the degree to which it relies on external funding sources such as operating grants and contributions. The benchmark set by the former OLG is greater than 60 per cent.
- The Council's own source operating revenue ratio of 29.1% is below the industry benchmark of 60%.
- The own source operating revenue ratio has decreased due to the increase in grants and contributions revenue during the year.


Unrestricted current ratio

- The 'unrestricted current ratio' is specific to local government and represents council's ability to meet its short-term obligations as they fall due. The benchmark set by the former OLG is greater than 1.5 times.
- The Council's unrestricted current ratio of 6.51 times is greater than the industry benchmark minimum of greater than 1.5 times.
- The Council's unrestricted current ratio has slightly increased due to lower current liabilities less specific purpose liabilities.




Debt service cover ratio

- The 'debt service cover ratio' measures the operating cash to service debt including interest, principal and lease payments. The benchmark set by the former OLG is greater than two times.
- The Council's debt service cover ratio of 15.84 times is greater than the industry benchmark of greater than 2 times
- The Council's debt service cover ratio remained relatively constant from 2019 to 2020.



Rates and annual charges outstanding percentage

- The 'rates and annual charges outstanding percentage' assesses the impact of uncollected rates and annual charges on council's liquidity and the adequacy of debt recovery efforts. The benchmark set by the former OLG is less than 10 per cent for regional and rural councils.
- The Council's rates and annual charges outstanding ratio of 6.83% is within the industry benchmark of less than 10% for regional and rural councils.
- The rates and annual charges ratio <u>has</u> remained relatively consistent in 2019 and 2020.



Audited Financial Statements

Cash expense cover ratio

- This liquidity ratio indicates the number of months the council can continue paying for its immediate expenses without additional cash inflow. The benchmark set by the former OLG is greater than three months.
- The Council's cash expense cover ratio was 11.02 months, which is above the industry benchmark of greater than 3 months.
- The Council's cash expense ratio has slightly decreased as there was less cash and cash equivalents during the year.



Public Access Defibrillators

Automatic External Defibrillators (AED's) play an essential part in trying to save the life of someone in cardiac arrest.

AED's are available for public use, 24 hours per day, in the following locations:

- Lockhart Ex-Servicemen's Club,
 83 Green Street, Lockhart—outside the front entrance
- Emily Gardens Aged Care, Emily Street, The Rock—located just inside the front door.

- Yerong Creek Bowling Club, 33 Cole Street, Yerong Creek—near the western entry, at hip height, adjacent to the bowling greens.



Council Snippets 16 November 2020

ENGINEERING & ENVORONMENTAL SERVICES REPORT

Works:

<u>Urana Road (MR 59)</u>: Approximately 10.7 km of Urana road shoulder widening works has been completed to date. Another 3.2km of primer seal has been completed with a further 2.2km gravelled.

Western Road (R2R): 3.7km of Western Road sealing has been completed. Widening of an additional 1km of shoulders is programmed for 2020-21.

<u>Wattles Lane</u>: Council has engaged a contractor to complete the survey and design for this project and the culverts have been ordered.

<u>HVSPP culvert upgrades</u>: Culverts are installed at Flood Detour Road, Grubben Road, Lockhart-The Rock Road and The Rock-Bullenbong Road. Sealing of culvert sections of Lockhart-The Rock Road and The Rock-Bullenbong Road to be completed in November.

<u>Grading of unsealed roads</u>: Council is continuing grading in accordance with its 12-month programme and recently completed grading on Wetmores Lane, Stoney Park Road, Bahrs Lane, Long Park Road, Chaplin Lane, Montagues Back Lane and Broughtons Lane.

Major Projects:

<u>Flood Mitigation Construction-The Rock</u>: Council submitted a revised grant application for Stage 2 flood mitigation works at The Rock, being the drainage works along Nicholas, Yerong and Urana Streets.

Road Safety:

Road Safety Audits: Continuing with the safety audit of roads within the Shire. The audit will form the basis of Council's Strategic Road Safety Plan and will be used for grant applications in the future.

National Road Safety Week: Under the NSW Local Government Road Safety Program (LGRSP), Lockhart Shire Council's Road Safety Officer has included National Road Safety Week (NRSW) 2020 as an approved project for the 2020/21 financial year. The NRSW initiative was previously scheduled for May 2020, however due to COVID-19 the event was postponed to the new date of 15 to 22 November 2020. Nationally the week is promoted by putting large yellow ribbons on some sculptures in Lockhart and BBQs.

<u>Fixing Local Roads</u>: Currently preparing application for Pritchard Place Lockhart as per Council's resolution.

Look Out Before You Step Out: Decals have been delivered and will replace faded decals.

Biosecurity and Environment:

<u>Control Program</u>: Priority has been given to the control of all vegetation on roadside shoulders for fire hazard reduction purposes throughout October, with particular focus on resistant ryegrass.

<u>Common White Snail Baiting Program</u>: Snail baiting application occurred on Fairview Lane on 19 October.

<u>Spring Fox Baiting Program</u>: Spring fox baiting occurred in October on the Galore Hill Scenic Reserve and Kincaids Reserve.

Parks and Gardens:

<u>Parks and Gardens</u>: Routine garden maintenance is being conducted including regular weeding, spraying, and mulching. Regular checks and maintenance to irrigation systems will continue throughout summer.

Council Snippets 16 November 2020

Mowing and Slashing: The Spring mowing schedule continues to be in full swing after frequent rain events and warmer temperatures. As growth rates increase, irrigated lawn mowing will be scheduled fortnightly. Some areas, including The Rock and Lockhart recreation grounds, have been requiring weekly maintenance.

<u>Weed Control</u>: Regular spraying and weeding in urban areas has continued. Spraying lawns for broadleaf weeds, especially clover, has also continued.

<u>Pools</u>: Swim season has commenced. Council's HR/WHS Coordinator ensured that the operation of the pools is consistent with COVID-19 safety guidelines and that users of the pools are aware of the restrictions associated with COVID-19. Parks and Facilities teams have ensured the grounds and gardens of both pools were immaculate before the opening of the pools on Saturday 17 October. The pools contractor is back for the 2020-21 season and will coordinate lifeguard duties, conduct regular vacuuming and water testing, and attend to the amenities buildings, gardens and lawns for both pools until March 2021.

Compliance:

Council's Compliance Officer focussed on properties with overgrown vegetation with letters to 62 property owners of which 34 completed vegetation reduction. Council will follow up the outstanding 28 not completed to date.
